Dear Friends

As the winter progresses we will begin to see the true impact of the cost of living crisis. After the trauma of the pandemic, we brace ourselves for yet more suffering.

One of the really wonderful initiatives which has come from this crisis is the Warm Welcome Campaign, which is partnering with thousands of organisations to enable warm spaces to be available for those who need them. I am delighted that St Paul's is able to participate in this scheme: there are times in the week when the main space of our church hall is not used, but the heating is on, so it has been a no-brainer for us to make that space available to those who need it.

It's a refreshing reminder that a lot of the church's outreach can be incredibly simple. And the same is true for individual acts of service. When we look at the great suffering and injustices of our world it is easy to feel helpless. What can I possibly do to stop war, or save the planet, or eradicate poverty? Sometimes it's the small act of kindness – the simple things – which can really make a difference.

In a few weeks' time we will hear again the story of a family for whom there was no room at the inn. St Benedict, in his Rule, instructs his monks that 'the stranger is to be welcomed as Christ himself.' May we, in our warm welcome this Advent and Christmas, find ourselves not only welcoming the Lord Jesus into our hearts, but also – in the person of the stranger – into our space and community.

Peggy lived in Shoreditch until the beginning of World War II, when she and her mother were evacuated to Bracknell. This was very different to the East End of London and it took her some time to get used to the country life. At first Peggy was a little afraid as she walked to school through a wood with her cousin, but she soon got used to it and learned to love the countryside. Peggy returned with her mother to their home in the East End after the war, but there was a surprise in store for her. One day she saw a man asleep in her mother's bed and ran to tell her, only to be told that it was her father! He had been away fighting in the war for so long that she had forgotten what he looked like.

Peggy inherited her parents' strong work ethic and studied hard at school and did well academically, but her ambition was to be an actress. This was not encouraged so, having worked as a switchboard operator for a while, she went to teacher training college and there made many lifelong friends. She began her teaching career at St. George the Martyr School in Inner London and stayed there for many years. She then taught briefly at St Andrew's School Southgate before returning to work in Inner London at St Clement Danes School, where she worked until she retired. She was an inspired and creative teacher and hundreds of children thrived and developed under her guidance.

Peggy was introduced to her future husband, Ken, by Brian Masters, who was then their parish priest but later became Bishop of Edmonton. Peggy and Ken had a shared love of travelling and sailing and were always happiest in the company of family and friends. They had one daughter, Sarah and the arrival of three grandchildren, Freddie, Jodie and Gaby, brought Peggy great joy in later life.

The family moved to Southgate in the 1980s and became members of St Paul's Church. In the following years Peggy served the church quietly and loyally in many roles including being our Christian Aid Representative and organising annual house to house collections, she helped to make our tapestry kneelers and, until recently, regularly repaired them. She was a flower arranger, helped with the parish magazine and she was a sidemen and a member of both the Prayer Group and the MU.

She will be missed by her many friends at St Paul's.

Advent Sunday began with a well-attended 'All Together' service at which the congregations from our usual two Sunday services worshipped together.

Immediately after this service everyone flocked into the Hall for the Scouts' annual Christmas Fair.







MORE ABOUT ADVENT SUNDAY AT ST PAUL'S









The talk was followed by a delicious afternoon tea, provided by the Trust Trustees, and then the formal AGM. The afternoon closed with some beautiful music and readings at our Advent Carol Service.

The Trust was set up as a charity in 1982 to provide funds to develop and maintain the fabric and amenities of St Paul's Church, the Garden of Rest and other Church buildings. Its most recent grant to St Paul's Church was £70,00 towards the cost of hall subsidence work

Since ancient times, trees have been part of many religions rituals around the world, however it is not certain how the modern Christmas tree came into being.

Many believe the tradition originated in Germany, thanks to St Boniface. Born and brought up in Devonshire, Boniface was sent as a missionary to Germany in the 8th Century to convert the pagan population to Christianity. There is a legend that, while in Bavaria, he came across a group of pagans preparing a sacrifice at an oak tree dedicated to their god, Thor. This was part of their Winter Solstice celebrations. Boniface grabbed the nearest axe and cut down the tree. The pagans expected their god, Thor, to strike him down dead, but nothing happened to Boniface so he called on them to accept that the power of his God was greater than theirs. It is said that immediately a fir tree grew in the oak's place (an evergreen to symbolise the everlasting love of the one true God) and that many pagans converted to Christianity and from then on they celebrated Christmas, not the Winter Solstice.

In Germany, as early as the Middle Ages, evergreen trees became part of a Christian celebration in December. Known as 'Paradise Trees', they were brought into houses on 24th December, the feast day of Adam and Eve, and hung with apples to represent the Garden of Eden. Over the years other decorations were added and it is said that in the 16th Century Martin Luther was the first person to hang lighted candles on the tree. By the 19th Century, 'Paradise Trees' had evolved into Christmas trees as we now know them and they had become a firmly established tradition in Germany. It was Queen Victoria's husband, Albert, a German Prince, who introduced this country to the custom of decorated Christmas trees in homes.

Another Christmas custom associated with trees was the burning of a Yule Log. This again began as a pagan custom, this time originating in Norway. Yule is the Scandinavian name for the Winter Solstice and, as part of their pagan celebrations, a large tree would be brought into the

house and gradually burnt during a period of twelve days at the end of December. This was when the days grew shorter and shorter and it was believed that the sun stood still but, if the Yule Log could be kept burning throughout the twelve days, the sun would be warmed up again and the days would grow longer. If the Yule Log was allowed to go out during these twelve days it was thought it would bring bad luck. As with many pagan customs, the Yule log gradually became part of the celebrations around Christmas but, with modern central heating, the nearest thing most of us will get to having a Yule Log is enjoying a delicious Chocolate Log Cake as part of our Christmas food.
