Dear Friends

On 15th June the Bishop of Edmonton joins us once again to baptise and confirm. The 10.30am Eucharist is a little longer and bit busier than usual on this Sunday. Consequently, I suspect this is an occasion when some people *avoid* coming to the 10.30am Eucharist, and either come to the 8 o'clock instead, or don't come to church at all. Friends, the opposite should be true! This is a 10.30am Eucharist *not to be missed*.

Firstly, and most obviously, we must be there to pray for and support those who are being baptised, confirmed, or received into the Communion of the Church of England. This is not simply a special moment for the candidates and their families. This is a special moment for the people of God – the household of faith – in this place. Even if you do not know any of the candidates individually, you still have a Christian duty to support them as they take this important step in their journey with Jesus Christ. They should know and feel that the Christian community is surrounding them in prayer.

Secondly, the local church is at its most *complete* when the bishop is present. What do I mean by this? The role of the priest is to celebrate the Eucharist on behalf of the bishop, because the bishop cannot be in every church on every Sunday. So every time I celebrate the Eucharist, it is my bishop's Eucharist which I celebrate. (That is why we never 'welcome' Bishop Anderson to St Paul's; he attends as our host, not as our guest.) There is, therefore, a beauty in the Christian community gathering around its bishop, linking us in a particular way to the universal church. St Ignatius of Antioch, writing at the turn of the first century, says: 'Wherever the bishop appears, there let the people be; as wherever Jesus Christ is, there is the catholic church.'

And thirdly, our baptism and confirmation falls on Trinity Sunday in this year when we celebrate the $1,700^{th}$ anniversary of the Council of Nicaea and the promulgation of the Nicene Creed. As we recall with

thanksgiving how the bishops of the fourth century church gathered to proclaim and teach the doctrine of holy church, confirming the truth that Jesus is 'eternally begotten [and] of one being with the Father,' so it is wonderful that we have our bishop with us on this Trinity Sunday, baptising and confirming adults and children in that same faith today.

Please pray for all those who will be baptised, confirmed and received into the Church of England as they prepare for these rites of Christian initiation, and too for Bishop Anderson and his ministry among us. And, just as importantly turn up on 15th June!

SAFEGUARDING AUDIT - YOUR HELP IS NEEDED

Over a five-year period, from 2023 – 2028, independent safeguarding audits are being carried out in every diocese across the Church of England. Each audit results in a report and action plan, to bring us closer to being a truly safe Church for all.

The audits will ensure that safeguarding is not just about policies and protocols but is a living thread woven through everything we do - creating churches where everyone feels safe, valued, and respected.

How you can help

A vital part of the independent audit is for as many people as possible in our church communities to complete a survey. It is important for as many voices as possible to be represented, so that the auditors gain a real picture of the culture in our diocese.

- There are several surveys, each for different groups of people.
- The surveys are anonymous, and you will not be asked to name your church.
- You are encouraged to complete as many surveys are as relevant to you.
- Each survey should only take 10 minutes.


The different surveys

You may fall into more than one group, in which case you are encouraged to complete all surveys relevant to you:

- Parish Community parishioners, worshippers, or attendees of other activity within our church
- Parish Workforce clergy, church officers, parish staff, volunteers, choristers and bell ringers
- Victims/survivors of church-related abuse
- Children and/or Young People
- Cathedral Worshipping Community those who visited, attended services or worshipped at the St Paul's Cathedral

For the children's survey, parents are asked to help those under the age of 13.

The Life of St Paul windows in St Paul's Church, Winchmore Hill, are an excellent example English stained glass from the Ward & Nixon partnership. Originally one window, they depict the life of St Paul in twelve scenes, starting with his approval of the stoning of St Stephen, and concluding with his own martyrdom by the sword.

In 1928 these windows were moved to their present positions either side of the chancel, where there are seldom studied.

In this meditation on these twelve moments in the life of the Apostle to the Gentiles, Fr Daniel will help to shed light on how Paul's life can inspire our discipleship today.





We are all familiar with the notion of a Damascus Road experience – something happens which totally changes the direction of travel – a conversion experience. Saul is the archetype for this.

We learned in the previous article that full of purpose Saul had set out for Damascus with permission to stamp out any groups of followers of Jesus that were residing there. He was doing this because he understood that in order for God's kingdom to flourish and be established on earth, the people of Israel

needed to make themselves right with God and Saul understood this to mean rooting out and destroying any dangerous, pagan or unorthodox beliefs, much as the prophets of the Torah had warned Israel to do. But something happened to him along the way. He saw a blinding light, he fell to the ground, he heard a voice whom he understood to be lesus and everything changed!

We could try to be armchair psychologists and try to understand exactly what happened within Saul's heart and mind that day, but it is better to direct our energy in attempting to understand the dramatic transformation Saul experienced. It is most often described as a conversion experience, and that may lead you to think that Saul was converted from Judaism to Christianity, but this is a mistake. The idea of two separate religions is a much more modern invention, early followers of Jesus were faithful Jews, but they had come to understand that Jesus was the fulfillment of the promise of God to bring in his kingdom and establish it on earth; that heaven and earth were reunited through the work of Jesus. This is what they meant when they proclaimed Jesus as Messiah.

Saul had been vehemently opposed to this, and yet on that Damascus

Road, he describes receiving a revelation of Jesus Christ. The moment shattered everything he had understood up to that point, and at the same time realised all his hopes. He understood clearly in that moment that Jesus was the fulfillment of Israel's scriptures and that God the Creator had raised Jesus from the dead declaring, not only that he really was Israel's Messiah, but that he had done what the One God had promised to do himself, in person. For Saul, all of Judaism was fulfilled in Jesus. This was a shocking, blinding reality, that would change the world. Saul came to himself, but literally could not see and so was led by the hand into the city of Damascus.

He stayed in a house in Straight Street, not eating or drinking, but praying. Of course he prayed, it was what he would have always done. But what form was that prayer to take now? What would loyalty to the One God look like now? These are the questions that would have been turning over and over in his mind.

On the third day, there was a knock at the door. The small group of Jesus followers living in Damascus must have known that Saul was coming for them, but one of their number, Ananias, had received a word from God, telling him to go to visit Saul and pray for him so he could recover his sight. Ananias was rightly nervous, but also obedient to God, and so he went to find Saul. It is striking that Ananias trusted God so much that he addressed Saul as 'Brother Saul'. He accepted Saul just as he was at that moment. He prayed for Saul and something like scales fell from his eyes. Saul regained his sight – and in more ways than one. Now he truly sees! Saul was immediately baptized, a moment of putting away his old life and demonstrating he now belonged to Jesus. He eats and regains his strength. Remarkably then Saul went straight to the synagogue to declare his new found understanding in Jesus being the fulfillment of God's promises. The long-awaited Messiah has come. The local community was shocked at the sudden turnaround of this hotheaded young man, and offended by it, so Saul departed and, according to a later letter he wrote to the people of Galatia, he 'went away at once into Arabia'. What was that all about? Why did he go? The story continues next month...


