I am taking a period of extended study leave, also known as a sabbatical, from I April, returning to parish duties on I July. The Diocese of London allows clergy to do this after every 10 years of ministry. This my first sabbatical since I was ordained in 2009.

#### What am I doing?

The theme of my sabbatical is Walking Norfolk's Churches. I am undertaking over 30 (mostly circular) walks, visiting around 200 churches. Norfolk has the highest concentration of medieval churches in Europe, and I will be reflecting on how they are an inheritance of faith and emblems of Norfolk's distinctive culture and history, and celebrating the ways in which they continue to play an important part in faith and culture today. I'll also be covering services some Sundays in villages where there isn't a resident priest.

The Diocese of London recommends that a third of the study leave is spent on proper rest and relaxation, so there'll be a good amount of family time too.

#### Stepping back

An important part of a sabbatical is having the opportunity to step back completely from the demands of parish ministry. This means I won't be checking my emails or my answerphone. As a family we will be living between here and Norfolk, with Elise and Cosmo here more than they're there, and me there more than I'm here. If you see us around Winchmore Hill, please do say hello, but Elise and I would be grateful if you didn't talk to us about parish matters! Fr Pete or the churchwardens will contact me, at their discretion only, if there's something which absolutely needs my attention.

#### Arrangements in the parish

St Paul's is a well-oiled machine, and everything will run as normal. When the Vicar is absent from their parish, the churchwardens are legally responsible. Fr Pete will also take on extra responsibility. Ann Petrides will step down as churchwarden at the Annual Meetings in

May, but she's kindly offered to continue as an 'acting churchwarden' until I'm back to provide continuity. Paul Prigmore has agreed to stand for election as churchwarden, together with Phil Morehen, for the coming year.

If in doubt, contact one of the people above and, if necessary, they'll forward your enquiry to the right person. Don't email them all at once, otherwise they'll be inundated with emails.

#### And finally

I am immensely grateful to everyone who is stepping up while I'm stepping back. While I know that one of the fruits of this sabbatical will be a refreshed and revitalised vicar in July, I am also conscious that a sabbatical can also be a fruitful time for those who might feel the call to step up and take on responsibility. It's a bit like an interregnum (the gap between one vicar leaving and the next arriving), except that it's shorter, and you know what (or who) you're getting at the end of it! So, as I allow the Holy Spirit to guide me in a very differently-shaped three months, I hope and pray the same is true for you.

#### THE LIFE OF ST CATHERINE OF SIENA (1347 – 1380)

St Catherine's feast day is April 29<sup>th</sup>. She is one of the foremost mystics of the Middle Ages, a spiritual teacher and a powerful advocate for peace and reconciliation in her time. She is patron saint of Italy, one of only a few women other than the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of Jesus to be a country's patron.

Born as the 24th of 25 children Catherine Biencasa felt her vocation as a young child, having a vision of Christ at the age of six, and taking a vow of perpetual virginity when she was only seven. Her family were indulgent to her spiritual fervour at first, but it became more problematic for them once she reached adolescence, when they felt she should grow out of it and instead marry as tradition dictated. When she protested by cutting off her hair, she was punished by being forced to be the maid servant of the house, and by being prevented from having her own room. Catherine seems to have taken this as part of her spiritual formation, delighting to serve her family and to constructing for herself an 'inner cell which no one could take away from her'. One day her father came across her praying and he saw a white dove above her head. From then he decided Catherine's vocation was real, and she was permitted to pursue it – that Christ would be her husband.

At sixteen, Catherine became a *Mantellata*, a tertiary member of the order of Saint Dominic. The early part of her time with the order was marked by a period of solitude where she spent almost three years in prayer and silence, and subject to extreme spiritual discipline. Nevertheless, she was tormented for much of this time and felt Christ to be absent from her, struggling in her prayers. Finally, she was rewarded with a real sense of intimacy with Christ and her prayers were answered in the form of a betrothal, she received a ring visible only to her. It would not have been surprising if Catherine had remained devoted in her contemplation, but instead, shortly before her twentieth birthday, Christ called her from her cell, telling her the 'service you cannot do me, you must render your neighbours'.

As a Mantellata, she was expected to nurse the sick and infirm at the hospitals in Siena. She talked and listened, treating all as members of

her family. She began to attract disciples, firstly two women who accompanied her but later young men also, who wrote all of her correspondence for her. As her influence grew, the wider community of Siena would come to her with their troubles asking for her wisdom and her intercessions. People would be changed just by being with her, something about the way she looked at them, with enormous interest and understanding glowing from her.

Soon, there were reports of supernatural events taking place and the news of Catherine and her following spread much further. She was summoned to Florence to be examined by the Master General of the Dominican order. They were impressed by her sanctity and assigned her a Dominican superior and confessor, the Blessed Raymond Capua. He is responsible for the record about Catherine, documented in detail in 'The Life of Catherine of Siena'.

The last seven years of her life were marked by her attempts to broker peace between the warring factions within Italy. Some years earlier the French Pope Clement V had relocated the papacy from Rome to Avignon, and there it had remained, becoming more and more corrupt.

This caused tensions with the city states of Italy, such that eventually, in 1375, Florence declared war against the papacy. Catherine stepped into this conflict in an attempt bring peace, by pleading with the current pope (Gregory XI) to return to Rome and to reform the Church. She spent time travelling between the Florentine cities, attempting to negotiate a peace, eventually settling in Rome for the

final two years of her life. Her popularity was such that the Pope ordered three priests to accompany her at all times in order to hear the confessions of the crowds of people who upon seeing her would ask for the sacraments!

Along with the many letters she dictated in her effort to bring peace, she also dictated 'The Dialogue'; an account of her mystical conversation with God. Its central metaphor is of Christ as the bridge, with humanity at one end, divinity at the other, uniting in the figure of Christ.

Her final months were pervaded with grief; her efforts at a lasting peace had been thwarted by an even worse outcome – that of a schism within the Church, and of her disappointment at the behaviour of the new Pope (Urban VI). She suffered what may have been a stroke in January of 1380 and lingered on until her death on April 29<sup>th</sup>, at the age of 33.

Reading the details of her life; the extreme ascetism, the mystical experiences, miracles and fantastic happenings can be rather alien to contemporary minds, but what comes across is an influential woman (no mean feat in her time) with a deep love of Christ and of all people, who was beloved by many and who changed the lives of those around her.


