Dear Friends

Many of you will be aware that I gave myself a little project in the autumn to build a model railway in time for our son's fourth birthday in December. I am chuffed (excuse the pun) with the result, which has rather exceeded my expectations. And Cosmo is pretty happy too!



It's a hobby which clearly captures people's imaginations. I've had so many conversations in the last few months with people who have fond memories of their fathers' and grandfathers' model railways. (Yes, it is a rather male-dominated hobby.) It's one of those pastimes which is delightfully *wholesome*.


I recently watched a programme in which the comedian, Julian Clary, spoke about his love of model railways. I was struck by a comment he made about how model railways allow us to create fictional idylls. Most model railways evoke charming, innocent scenes. No one's drugdealing behind the station; no one's stabbing someone to death; no one's been hit by a passing train. There's no war or violence. There's no climate change. I guess it's a form of escapism, which is why it has such an endearing quality. That's in very stark contrast to many contemporary hobbies. Many video games, for example, take us into a fictional world which can often be very violent, and I worry about how the cheapness of *fictional* lives is played out in actions in the *real* world. The North Circular seems to be full of drivers who think they're at a games console, rather than the wheel of an *actual* car. Knife and gun crime is rife in our city and borough.

A new year is a good time to think about how we want our society and our world to look. It's easy to be caught up in nostalgia or idealism, and neither are necessarily very healthy. But God gives us a vision of a new heaven and a new earth (Revelation 21), and Jesus teaches us to pray 'thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven'. As Christians, we are to strive for a world which is more just, more peaceful. We are to strive for a world which is more like heaven.

I pray that 2024 may be a year of blessings for us a church family, and that by our worship, prayer and action we may help make a sad and suffering world a little bit more like the heaven for which we long.

NEW BISHOP OF EDMONTON ANNOUNCED



Rev Canon Dr Anderson Jeremiah is to become the new Bishop of Edmonton. He is currently Associate Dean in the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences, Lancaster University, having been appointed as its first Lecturer in World Christianity in 2012. He is also Associate Priest at St Paul's Scotforth, in the Diocese of Blackburn. Anderson grew up in Tamil Nadu, the southernmost state in India, as a Dalit

Christian. He is the first Dalit, and the first clergyperson ordained in the Church of Southern India (CSI), to be appointed Bishop in the Church of England. He has lived across five Anglican provinces and also served across rural to urban contexts and amongst deprived and affluent communities.

On his appointment, Sarah, Bishop of London, said, "Today's announcement is a blessing for the Church in North London, which I am sure will thrive under Anderson's leadership and ministry. He brings a combination of experience – pastoral, academic, theological and strategic – which is a great gift to the Diocese of London as a whole. The perspectives he has gained through living and working in a breadth of cultures and roles will enrich the senior staff team and the life of the church in this city.

"London's Diocesan 2030 Vision sets out an ambition for racial justice: how we plan to move forward to truly representing the body of Christ in all its richness – and grow healthily. To reach every Londoner we need to be active in combatting racism and racial injustice. The contributions made by the Racial Justice Priority Group have been invaluable, and I'm in no doubt that Anderson will help lead this transformative work as we continue to tackle the evil of racism here in London."



FOODBANK APPEAL

A huge thank you to everyone who contributed to our appeal for Christmas food for the North Enfield Foodbank. Your donations will have helped many local families to celebrate with some special treats.

Sadly, the need for foodbanks is not diminishing, in fact they continue to provide a greatly needed service as 22% of people living in the UK are currently living below the poverty line and during the coming winter months many families will be turning to foodbanks for help. Any donations of non-perishable food, and also toiletries, would be very welcome and they can be left at our collection point in the church porch.

Our food collection point in the church porch is available for anyone to use - no questions asked and no referral needed. Anyone who finds themself in need is invited to take up to 6 cans per household per visit. Surplus cans are shared with local parishes for similar purposes and with the North Enfield Foodbank.

Our stock of cans is currently running rather low so some donations would be very welcome

A BUSY DECEMBER AT ST PAUL'S

As usual, December was a very busy month at St Paul's Church, right from the first day of the month when the Charity Committee organized a 'Bangers & Mash' evening, which included a musical



entertainment by 'The Music Hall Madams'. Fifty guests enjoyed the meal and then sat back to watch the performance, joining in many of the choruses. The evening raised over £400, which will be shared between The Alzheimer's Association and Christian Aid.

After the All-Together Eucharistic on Advent Sunday, 3rd December, there was the everpopular Scout Christmas Fair, which was, as usual, a very busy event.





Later in the day the St Paul's Trust AGM took place. The guest speaker was the Area Dean, Fr Stephen Gallagher, who spoke about the work of the Deanery Synod. This was followed by a delicious tea

and the AGM of the Trust. (The St Paul's Trust is a charity that was set up to support the work and mission of our church.)

Advent Sunday concluded with a beautiful candle-lit Advent Carol Service. Throughout Advent, and for the first time at St Paul's, we had a parish posada, a Mexican tradition that re-enacts Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem 2000 years ago. Families were invited to host Mary and Joseph for a night as they travelled from house to house during Advent. The people who took part, young and older,



found it a moving experience to host the Holy Family for a night as



they travelled on their way through N21.

On Thursday 7th December our MU organised a Christmas Fellowship Lunch for forty guests from our church and the wider community. Everyone enjoyed the traditional meal, served with all the trimmings, plus a visit from Father Christmas and an entertainment by children from the Leapfrog Nursery.

Our Sunday Schools' annual Nativity Play was performed at the Parish Eucharist on 17th December, much to the delight of the congregation.





Later the same day, the church was full for the beautiful candle-lit service of Nine Lessons and Carols.

This was followed by mulled wine and mince pies.

A BUSY DECEMBER AT ST PAUL'S CONTINUED

'Carols on The Green' 2023 on 17th December was an amazing success! Despite it being a rather cold evening and wet underfoot. a crowd of around 500 people from our local community joined us to sing carols and enjoy the refreshments provided by local businesses. Thanks to MU committee member Anne Croxford, who organised our appeal, a superb collection of new children's books was delivered to the North Enfield Foodbank for distribution to younger members of families using that facility who otherwise might have had few, if any, Christmas presents. The Mothers' Union (MU) is not just a group of women who meet occasionally here at St Paul's to chat over a cup of tea and slice of cake. It is much, much more than that!

The Mothers' Union is an international Christian charity that aims to demonstrate the Christian faith in action through the transformation of communities worldwide. It aims to reach out in love and service to people of all faiths and none, in 83 countries, and to promote stable family life. It has been doing this since 1876.

Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby has declared, "There is only one Mothers' Union. It is the world's oldest and largest women's movement. It is a gift of God to Anglicans and is one of the Anglican Communion's greatest gifts to the worldwide church." He has also described it as "the heart and love of the Church". However, a survey at General Synod concluded that Mothers Union is "the Anglican Church's best kept secret", so here are some facts about it.

WHAT DOES THE MOTHERS' UNION DO?

The Mothers' Union is firmly rooted in a voluntary ethos centred on mutual respect and collaboration. Its decision making, leadership and programmes are undertaken and driven by its members within their own communities worldwide.

At the local level MU groups, like ours here at St Paul's, fundraise for the charity and run individual projects to meet specific local needs.

At the national and international level, the Mothers' Union provides resources and funding for core programmes such as the Literacy and Financial Education, Marriage Preparation and Parenting Programmes. These help women and men to develop skills to support their families.

WHO CAN JOIN?

Our members are not all mothers, or even all women. Among our members at St Paul's are men and women, some single, some married, some are parents and grandparents and some have no children. In other words, **membership is open to everyone**.

To find out more there are leaflets at the back of church with information about this charity, or talk to one of our MU members.
